

On October 30, 2018, the United Nations Human Rights Committee adopted a new General Comment on the right to life set out in the International Covenant on Civil and Political Rights. Paragraph 66 begins:

"The threat or use of weapons of mass destruction, in particular nuclear weapons, which are indiscriminate in effect and are of a nature to cause destruction of human life on a catastrophic scale is incompatible with respect for the right to life and may amount to a crime under international law."

It additionally affirms the obligations

"to pursue in good faith negotiations in order to achieve the aim of nuclear disarmament" and "to afford adequate reparation to victims whose right to life has been or is being adversely affected by the testing or use of weapons of mass destruction." MONDAY,
